Course Description and Course Goals

Course Description

The Introductory French as a Foreign Language course aims to provide students with no knowledge of the French language with a fundamental knowledge of French. Under the instructor's guidance, students will work on a basic level of oral and written comprehension and expression, as well as working on oral interaction. Course structure will remain flexible to adapt to the overall classroom progression and to allow for a general foundation in French to be expanded upon after the program.

Course Objectives

- Introducing oneself
- Navigating (giving and receiving directions)
- Communicate in simple contexts (family, commerce, restaurants, transportation)
- Develop a base understanding of French daily life (lifestyle, meals, hobbies)

Texts, Materials, and Supplies

- All required texts will be provided during the program.
- A French-Native Language dictionary is recommended.
- Moderate mobility will be required of students during a walking tour of the city.

Grading

Course Description and Course Goals

Course Description

The Intermediate French as a Foreign Language course is a general program for a class of students with a varying range of knowledge of the French language as well as different cultural, educational, and linguistic backgrounds. To meet the needs of each students this course adapts to the overall level of the class and therefore some objectives may be changed over the course of the program. The course is entirely taught in French using audio, video, and written documents to supplement lessons. A particular focus will be on oral production and comprehension, as well as honing grammatical skills through written and oral exercises.

Course Objectives

- Conjugate in past, present, and future indicative
- Utilize the present subjunctive
- Correct usage of object pronouns
- Discuss technical subjects

Course Description and Course Goals

Course Structure

Prerequisites

Students in this course are expected to have a high functioning level of French (CEFR B1-B2) to be confirmed by the placement test during the first class.

Course Description

The Advanced French as a Foreign Language course aims to enrich students' working knowledge of France's culture and professional and institutional communication norms. Classroom activities will focus on oral production and comprehension, and will be taught entirely in French. Strong participation will be required of students as they work with the instructor to attain a level of French allowing them to actively participate in French discourse.

Course Objectives

- Have a sustained debate on various aspects of French culture
- Explain France's contributions to the sciences
- Recognize language registers in French
- Adapt communication to the appropriate context
- Consistently apply French spelling conventions

Texts, Materials, and Supplies

- All required texts will be provided during the program.
- A French-Native Language dictionary is recommended.
- Moderate mobility will be required of students during a walking tour of the city.
